

Meet a Few Right-wing Extremists

Samuel Adams was known as the "Father of the American Revolution." Adams was an early American leader and patriot for the cause of liberty in this country. He was the instigator of the Boston Tea Party. Adams was a signer of the Declaration of Independence and served as a member of congress until 1781. He formed the Committee of Correspondence that was responsible to keep the colonists united, and to keep them informed concerning the violated rights they were suffering under the British. Adams served as Lieutenant Governor and Governor of Massachusetts. (Ted Kennedy and company would have been run out of town on a rail in those days.)

Adams wrote a work called, "The Rights of the Colonists." In it he said, "The right to freedom being a gift of the Almighty... The rights of the colonists as Christians... may be best understood by reading and carefully studying the institutions of the Great Law Giver of the Christian Church, which are to be found clearly written and promulgated in the New Testament." This work of Adams was widely circulated in the colonies at that time and was a rallying cry for the colonists leading up to the Revolutionary War. Adams' last will and testament said, "Principally, and first of all, I resign my soul to the Almighty Being who gave it, and my body I commit to the dust, relying on the merits of Jesus Christ for the pardon of my sins." If Samuel Adams were alive today and faced with the government we are faced with, he certainly would be calling for another Boston Tea Party. He also would be considered a right-wing extremist by the socialists in Washington, D.C.

Roger Sherman is recognized as a great American Revolutionary patriot. He was the only one of the Founding Fathers to sign all four of the major founding documents for our country. Sherman signed the Articles of Associations in 1774, the Declaration of Independence in 1776, the Articles of Confederation in 1777, and the Constitution of the United States in 1787. He was considered a traitor (radical right-wing extremist) by the British. Sherman also served this country as a U.S. House and Senate representative. On June 28, 1787, during the Constitutional Convention, Sherman seconded the motion to allow Benjamin Franklin's request to have Congress open in daily prayer. This practice of opening Congress in prayer continues to this day. Roger Sherman, in one speech he gave, said, "Admiring and thankfully acknowledging the riches of redeeming love, and earnestly imploring that Divine assistance which may enable us to live no more to ourselves, but to Him who loved us and gave Himself to die for us." President John Adams said about Sherman, "...an old Puritan, as honest as an angel, and as firm in the cause of American Independence as Mount Atlas."

Our country needs men who will stand against the socialist political machine of President Barack Hussein Obama. Anyone who is against killing unborn babies, illegal immigration, or Big Brother government is considered a right-wing extremist by Obama and company.
